

Refuge Canada Tent Travelling Exhibit

Refuge Canada Tent is a small, bilingual exhibit created by the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21 to travel to museums, libraries and community centres across Canada. The exhibit was designed to resemble a tent and is the same size as a typical shelter used in refugee camps today.

Refuge Canada Tent raises awareness of the complex issues surrounding the history of refugees in Canada. Drawing upon oral histories, archival images and interactives, this immersive exhibit serves as an introduction to the context for Canada's place in the global refugee crisis and brings to light the challenges faced by refugees in Canada.

This exhibit was adapted from the larger exhibition, *Refuge Canada*, which is currently travelling to museums across Canada.

Required space: 30.6 m² (330 ft²)

Components: 6 fabric covered walls; 1 pop-up banner, 8 interactive reader rails

Media components: One 32" touchscreen (single outlet required)

Cost: One-way transportation, no rental fee

Installation/Deinstallation: 2-3 people, 2.5 hours
Designed for easy installation by non-technical staff


